The NDIC Quarterly journal welcomes original scholarly publishable research articles from practicing professionals, academics, financial analysts, researchers, policy analysts, and related professionals/experts, in the fields of Deposit Insurance, Banking, Banking Supervision & Regulation, Economics, Econometrics with Finance Implications, Empirical Finance, Financial Risk Management, Development Finance, Corporate Governance, Management and emerging issues related to Banking and Finance.

About this journal

The *NDIC Quarterly Journal* is an official quarterly publication of the Nigeria Deposit Insurance Corporation (NDIC) published by the Research, Policy and International Relations Department. It is an independent, peer-reviewed journal that is available in traditional hard-copies as well as in pdf formats from the Corporation's website. It is designed to provide an avenue for the production of scholarly works of both qualitative and quantitative inclinations. Other submissions in the form of view-points, research reports and surveys are also acceptable.

Submitted articles are to undergo a double-blind review process by the Corporation's Editorial Board to determine the acceptability of submissions. The double-blind review means that the identities of the authors are hidden from the reviewers, and vice versa. The review ensures that articles conform with the set out standards of factual and technical accuracy, originality and contribution to existing literature, readability and depth, as well as potent managerial and policy implications.

Submission Guidelines

- 1. Articles are accepted for review with the understanding that the submission has been approved by all of the authors and that the submission is not currently under review at another publication. Also, all articles are the opinions of the authors. The NDIC is not liable for contents of articles submitted by authors.
- 2. The NDIC Quarterly accepts only electronic submissions, preferably in Microsoft Word.
- 3. There is no submission fee.
- 4. Articles must be written in English and should be submitted with a concise abstract. Authors should place the abstract on the title page of the article. The abstract should be an overview of the article, excluding references and equations and not more than 250 words.
- 5. Specifically, the suggested structure of an academic article reporting the findings of a quantitative study for publication in the NDIC Quarterly is as follows:
 - i. Abstract less than 250 words
 - ii. Keywords 4 6 keywords
 - iii. Introduction
 - iv. Literature review (Alternatively: Background, conceptual development or framework)

- v. Methods (Alternatively: Methodology)
- vi. Results or Findings
- vii. Discussion
 - Conclusion
 - •Policy implications
 - Limitations
 - •Recommendations for future research
- viii. References
- 6. Articles should be one-half (1.5)-spaced on A4 paper dimensions, using a 12-point font size and a default typeface (recommended fonts are Tahoma, Times New Roman, Helvetica, Calibri and Arial). The article should not exceed 30 pages or 10,000 words. References, footnotes, and legends should be single-spaced.
- 7. Text should be cited using Harvard referencing style listed alphabetically at the end of the article.
- 8. Articles must present the highest intellectual integrity to be authenticated by the 'turn-it-in' anti-piracy software. High premium is placed on originality and adequate standards of data, techniques, methodology, and result reporting. We seek to protect the rights of our authors and we always investigate claims of plagiarism or misuse of published articles. Equally, we seek to protect the reputation of the journal against malpractice.

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- 9. The author should disclose any prior distribution and/or publication of any portion of the material to the Editor for his consideration and ensure that appropriate attribution to the prior distribution and/or publication of the material is included.
- 10. Author(s) of published articles would receive a token as honorarium per article.
